1 st <i>If the Settlers have the option of Upper of Lower Canada.</i>	<i>I have mentioned it as my option is with the Settlers but I could not say positively.</i>	<i>They shall have the option to the province. The precise spot must be regulated by the Government of the Colony.</i>
2 nd <i>If accommodation of Boats shall be provided from Glasgow to the respective Ports where embarkation takes place, at the expence of Government.</i>	<i>This is my own idea + I have said so to them, the expence will be trifling + will keep them from straggling and the Annoyance of Friends.</i>	<i>Any expence of this kind will be defrayed by Government.</i>
3 rd <i>As to the freight or charge of Children above 16+ under 21-</i>		<i>To be paid for as grown persons.</i>
4 th <i>As to the Pension of Soldiers Sergants etc. continuing, +whether payable in Canada.</i>		<i>Measures will be taken for continuing their pensions + for their payment in Canada.</i>
5 th <i>Upon what footing do single Men go out, for instance, two Brothers who may be under or above 21 years of Age.</i>		<i>They go out as independent settlers; ie each brother if above 21 years of will have a grant of 100 acres, If once brother only is above that age he may take out his brother who will on attaining the age have a similar grant of land given under similar circumstances.</i>
6 th <i>Whether Bedding + smaller articles are to be provided + at what rate.</i>		<i>Soldiers Bedding will be provided for each settler.</i>
7 th <i>If a young Man under or above 21 may take out his sister on the same terms as a wife as specified in the Regulations, upon depositing 2 Guineas.</i>		<i>Yes but not more than one sister.</i>
8 th <i>Will the passengers be conveyed with their families and Baggage from Quebec to the Settlement or Ground allotted for them in Canada, at the expence of Government.</i>	<i>I have said, but not with assurance, that I presumed Government would provide for their Comfort + Conveyance + at any rate that there would be no interruption in their rations.</i>	<i>The answer given is correct. The will be forwarded as Troops are forwarded either on Foot or otherwise as may appear most expedient to the Governor.</i>
9 th <i>Will any surgeons be required for the Voyage outwards, + what encouragement may they expect out + home + where may Application be made for the Appointments.</i>		<i>If surgeons are required they will be provided by the Transport Board.</i>
10 th <i>Is Government to reserve any claim upon any part of the Wood on the Lots to be granted to settlers + the nature + extent thereof - It is said there is some existing regulation on this subject, of which I am not yet informed-</i>		<i>The grants of Land will be made under the same regulations as all grants of Land in Canada are made. No new ones will be imposed. The minerals are reserved for the use of the Crown but there is no reservations as to Wood.</i>

<p>11th Does Government intend to grant a Portion of the Land to be laid out in Townships where some of the Settlers might reside together and what extent of Land to be allowed in such cases.</p>		<p>Any settlers wishing to Settle together will be permitted to do so on stating their intention previous to sailing. Each Settler above 21 will, wether single or in company with others, have 100 Acres as stated in the memorandum.</p>
<p>12th As to Batchelors above 16 + under 21 + unmarried females above 16 who have not parents, or whose parents do not go – What Encouragement for each of them is permitted to go?</p>	<p>I have said that I suppose there might be objections to any unmarried female proceeding to Canada without the protection of a near relative + that I must refer Applicants in the meantime to the Instruction of Government.</p>	<p>Batchelors are provided for by the memorandum. Single women will not be permitted to proceed as settlers unless they are daughters of a Settler or as above mentioned the sister of a settler.</p>
<p>13th Whether is is the intension of Government that single men should be excluded</p>		<p>By no means. They are the most useful class of persons and that which is most desirable to encourage.</p>
<p>14th If a Widow having Children will be allowed to proceed + if so, what deposit necessary + encouragement upon landing, if her children be 21 + partly above 16.</p>		<p>No encouragement will be given to Widows with families or without.</p>
<p>15th May a Wife follow her husband at a future Embarkation, in case such shall take place upon her depositing 2.2.0</p>	<p>I have supposed they may.</p>	<p>Yes.</p>
<p>16th If Grandchildren, or orphans not 16 under the charge of Relatives of friends be carried out free, and receive the same Encouragement as Children accompanied by their Parents when they attain the age of 21 as pr. Regulations.</p>		<p>Grandchildren will be permitted but it is not desirable to increase the number of Children by extending permission to other relatives or friends.</p>
<p>17th Is the grant of land to be conveyed to Settlers by Deeds free of any Law or other expence; + if done on their getting possession, or when subject of course to forfeiture as mentioned in the Conditions in case they leave the Settlement within 2 years.</p>		<p>The grant will be made on their arrival by deed free of expence and will as all other grants do revert to the Crown upon being abandoned or not cultivated by the Settler.</p>
<p>18th Does Government sell Lands in Canada + at what price pr 100 acres + where situated. This question has been put several times by Persons in better circumstances.</p>		<p>Government will not sell its land but there is no difficulty in making purchases in Canada or in obtaining leases to Crown land to any extent. Persons with Capital who take out Labourers will receive larger Grant proportioned to their Capital and their means of Cultivation but by such persons a passage would not be required.</p>

<p>19th <i>Whether Implements + Rations started to be at Prime Cost are to be rated at the original Sterling Cost or at the Halifax or Quebec Currency at the time of Delivery</i></p>		<p><i>Prime Cost is what the Article cost in this Country and is therefore Ster. Money.</i></p>
<p>20th <i>Will servants above 16 be obliged to lodge the same deposit as Masters - + if any distinction between Male + Female if unmarried.</i></p>		<p><i>All persons above 16 must take the deposit required. The Memorandum answers the other part of the question.</i></p>
<p>21st <i>Is bedding for the voyage to be provided by Government to Settlers.</i></p>		<p><i>The Settlers on board ship will have the accommodation which Troops embarked for Canada receive.</i></p>
<p>22nd <i>Whether a number of People United may not suggest a Pastor or Schoolmaster, although they may not be of the established Church + what number is necessary for such a Nomination - + if Government is to extend their Bounty to all sects of Religions</i></p>		<p><i>Certainly. No distinction as to Religious Sect.</i></p>
<p>23rd <i>Are Pastors + Schoolmasters obliged to the same deposit money as the Common Settlers.</i></p>		<p><i>Yes.</i></p>
<p>24th <i>Is Government to give them any Assistance, + to what extent; in building their houses, churches, School houses + what is the extent of the lands allotted to a Clergyman, or if land is to be given to the School-master also.</i></p>		<p><i>Clergyman and Schoolmaster will each have 100 acres. The assistance required in Building + c. must be given by the Settlers who accompany him.</i></p>
<p>25th <i>Does Government intend giving Arms + Ammunition to the Settlers or any part of them upon their landing in the Colony to protect themselves from the Enemy, Indians, etc.</i></p>		<p><i>They will be protected as all other settlers are but there is no necessity from the nature of the place for Arming individuals except in case of actual war.</i></p>
<p>26th <i>Will any of the Settlers who have it in their power to allowed to take a Gun + some Ammunition for his individual use and protection</i></p>	<p><i>I have answered that I did not know what regulations Government may have laid down with regard to Arms to Settlers or restraints upon their possessing such but that I supposed [there] was nothing to prevent any man having his own musket as in the other British Dominions in Europe for his own protection.</i></p>	<p><i>Everyman may in this exercise his own discretion.</i></p>
<p>27th <i>Is it to be clearly understood that all the settlers without exception who take the benefit of the present Regulations, shall receive their Rations for 6 or 8 months from the date of their landing in the Colony free of any charge or deduction whatever.</i></p>		<p><i>Rations will be allowed free of any charge or deduction for a limited time.</i></p>

<p>28th <i>Whether Settlers who are able be allowed to take any pieces of Cloth or Linen for their Private use.</i></p>	<p><i>My answer is that I know nothing to prevent the carrying out of cloth or linen for private use, or any other lawful commodity, so be they not exceed the tonnage allowed.</i></p>	<p><i>If Settlers export articles liable to export duties here or import duties in Canada they cannot be exempted from the usual Custom House regulations.</i></p>
<p>29th <i>Will Mechanics be allowed to take their Working tools along with them.</i></p>		<p><i>Certainly but it is not intended to encourage other Mechanics than those who may be useful in Agriculture or in making a first Settlement such as Carpenters, Masons, Bricklayers, Smiths, etc.</i></p>
<p>30th <i>Are the Settlers to be carried out in terms of the Act 43 GeoIII Cap 56 in 1803 regulating vessels carrying Passengers to foreign parts, by which 2 tons burthen P. Register is allowed to each person whether Adults or Children.</i></p>		<p><i>They will be carried out in Transports under the same regulations as those under which Troops are carried out 2 Tons being allowed per Man.</i></p>
